We dedicate this Annual Report to Bruce Montgomery, who has recently passed away. One of the first people Dan Curll contacted to serve as founding members of the organization to save the Mill was Bruce Montgomery. Bruce immediately joined the cause and used his wisdom and legal expertise to secure the 501(c)3 designation of nonprofit status for the Mill Hollow Heritage Association. This designation enabled the group to raise tax deductible contributions and to apply for relevant grants. Bruce's role in all of this was pivotal. He served on the Board for several years.

OUR MISSION: The Mill Hollow Heritage Association (MHHA) operates Chase's Mill in Alstead, NH, as a workshop for hands-on learning and a community gathering space. Our water-powered mill embodies the history of small-town industry, celebrating New England's vibrant past while inspiring the future of sustainable power and rural technology.

LOOKING BACK: 2022 HIGHLIGHTS

Music opened the summer season with a June concert on Lake Warren by musicians Randy Miller, Kathy Torrey, Andy Davis, and Laurie Lindenbaum. Twenty-four classes, workshops, and lectures drew about 300 people, with many participants returning for more than one event. Feedback about workshops and lectures was overwhelmingly positive -- everyone who filled out feedback forms indicated they would both tell others about events at the Mill and take another class at the Mill. Master woodworker Kevin Warzecha hosted open hours in the woodworking shop where neighbors used modern equipment on a variety of projects.

The Women's Woodworking class offered both skill building and improvements to the Mill such as a bookcase, built-in storage for tables, and closing in the knee wall in the Community Room.

Volunteer Bob Brown assisted summer campers from the Orchard School who came to experiment with designing model waterwheels. Waterpower tours on weekends drew more visitors, among them members from the Timken Foundation of Canton, Ohio.

Timken awarded Chase's Mill \$52,362 back in 2020 to restore old machinery, furnish the community room, reclaim Lake Edith, and match the Northeast Heritage Economy Program grant.

In September the Mill Hollow Heritage Association received a Preservation Award from the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance honoring our work in preserving Chase's Mill.

The season closed with a community discussion of the 2005 Alstead Flood livestreamed for a wider audience. Volunteer Tafi Brown curated an exhibition of photographs and designed a commemorative quilt centered on the broken culvert that caused the flood.

Archeologist Robert Goodby will present "Digging Into Native History in New Hampshire" and Gail Golec will describe a Christianized Native person who lived in Alstead—see our website and Facebook page for schedules and registration.

We also bid farewell to two long-serving Board members, Betsy Anderson and Bryony Romer. Betsy served as Board Secretary and managed governance issues. Bryony handled donor relations and fundraising. While their Board service will be sorely missed, we look forward to seeing them every summer when they return to East Alstead. Richard Towne and Charlie Montgomery also left the Board due to the pressure of other obligations.

IN OTHER NEWS

Jill Hall has been promoted from part time Programs Director to Administrative Director. A graduate of Yale, Jill brings years of experience in private and public education and museum work. Her new role as Administrative Director recognizes her indispensable skills in organization, record keeping, finance, outreach, and marketing.



COMMUNITY PROGRAMS FUNDING

An anonymous donor awarded Chase's Mill five years of significant funding to hire a part time steward to assist with events, to support use of Mill spaces by individuals, groups and organizations that have a community focus consistent with our mission, and to contribute to costs for speakers and workshop leaders. This gift, the Turps Fund, complements the Dan Curll Community Programs Fund begun in 2021. Together these gifts ensure that we can provide a diversity of high-quality workshops, classes, and evening programs, as well as enhancing the openness and accessibility of the Mill.

LOOKING FORWARD IN 2023

We hope you will visit the Mill this summer, when Waterpower Tours will again be available on a drop-in basis from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend and other times by appointment. Activities that we are planning this year are centered around the theme of Celebrate Wood!

Wood in all its forms has been important to local residents as long as people have lived here. From the days of the first people living in the area to modern times, forests have been a source for food and shelter, and provide rich habitat for the animals. Today, we appreciate the forests' beauty and serenity. Wood has also been central to much of the history of Chase's Mill. It was outfitted as a sawmill in the mid 19th century. It produced lumber and wood products such as shingles and dowels. It was then rebuilt in the early 20th century and furnished with water-power woodworking tools.

From July 1 - September 1 classes, lectures, and workshops will explore this theme with a presentation on woodlot management, a walk through a managed forest, a class on turning bowls, and a Beginner Woodworking for Everyone class series. The Mill will also offer returning favorites like papercrafting and watercolor painting. In addition, we will honor and learn about the first people of what we now call the Monadnock region with a series of events throughout the month of July. Check the website in June for the full list of events. We look forward to seeing you!

IN AND AROUND CHASE'S MILL Watch for changes as we continue improvements to our historic site. Grant applications are underway to build an accessible restroom and drill a well. Water from Warren Brook has been used in our wash sinks and pumped uphill to the big tank that supplies the wet table used for children's activities. But cyanobacteria blooms in Lake Warren mean we now need a reliable source of clean, potable water. Inside the Mill, Heman Chase's grandson, Nathan Perry, will continue restoring the historic 24-inch planer. machine lathe, and two star-wheels that control the influx of water into the turbine that drives the water-powered planer and band saw. New Board member Perley Lund has volunteered to install a tighter water-saving gate to the penstock, improving the ability to offer waterpower demonstrations when millpond water is low.
