Looking to 2020 - Programming

Although construction will continue next spring and beyond, our **Community Programming Team** is hard at work developing the Mill's varied offerings. Last August more than 30 people gathered at *LEAF Charter School* to brainstorm the details of what activities we would host. Since then, board member **Jim Gruber** has been leading a group of volunteers who meet monthly to refine those ideas. These are subject to change, but next July, the shop will be buzzing with classes such as *Woodworking*,



Timber Framing, and Hand Tool Sharpening. The community room upstairs will feature offerings such as Word Craft - Oral Traditions, Poetry, and Storytelling. Other activities will include talks, tours, and exhibits on the History and Future of Water Power, plus guided nature walks along Warren Brook.

Our promise is to provide a safe, welcoming environment in which people of all ages and backgrounds can come together to learn, to build, to tinker, and to create.

We're happy to announce that we have just received a third grant from the Putnam Foundation which will be used in 2020 to repair the chimney and hearth upstairs. We are actively applying to other organizations to meet construction and educational needs. While Chase's Mill will open in July, there are still many important items on our list, some of which will likely need to be phased over time. These include:

- Building an ADA lift plans are done and approved cost is about \$80,000
- Installing septic for grey water and designing and building parking spaces on the hill cost is about \$30,000
- Emergency lighting
- Safety goggles, ear protection, and related items
- 50 folding chairs plus a few folding tables
- Assorted office equipment
- Hand tools for woodworking classes
