# Quarterly Update July 2017

#### \$100,000 LCHIP GRANT MATCHED

<u>Construction to Begin</u>

Through the generous financial contributions of individuals, foundations, and businesses, plus donations of in-kind materials such as lumber, building materials and labor, we have successfully matched LCHIP's (New Hampshire Land Community and Heritage Investment Program) \$100,000 grant. Additionally, MHHA has recently received final approval of construction plans and costs, so Phase One construction / rehabilitation efforts will begin in the next few weeks. These include foundation and masonry work to stabilize the building as well as replacing the dormers and roofing. Costs for Phase One exceed \$200,000 by approximately \$20,000, so to complete Phase One we will need to raise the additional funds. This fall, we will launch a fundraising effort to achieve this and also provide a financial base for Phase Two construction which will focus on restoring the waterworks.

Join us for Old Woodworking Skills Demo Aug. 26 from 10 - 12 p.m. Skills such as: using old molding planes to make moldings, how to received a \$10,000 grant from the New York-based <u>Bay and Paul Foundations</u>. We are happy to update that they have awarded us an additional \$15,000 for a total of \$25,000. These monies were an important part of meeting the LCHIP match.

We are also happy to report that the Manchesterbased <u>Samuel P. Hunt Foundation</u> recently awarded MHHA a \$10,000 grant to be used towards bank stabilization behind the Mill, chimney restoration, and related efforts.

## Other News

Although we are not yet able to host on-going educational events at the Mill, MHHA board members are continuing community outreach making presentations to local groups including schools and historical groups.

Look for our booth -- with working models from the Mill -- at the Aug. 12 Acworth Sestercentennial celebration.

Thank you to surveyor **David Mann**, who generously donated a significant portion of his labor in surveying the Mill property. This was an important step in our being "shovel ready" for construction.

### Looking to the Future

We are beginning to plan and cost out Phase Two construction which will focus on restoring the water works and related machinery. We are writing grant applications to help fund this next phase and will be launching a fundraising effort this fall.
