

2019: A Year of Completion and Transition



Year-end 2019 marked the completion of Phase One of the Mill Hollow Heritage Association's (MHHA) objectives. When the nonprofit was formed in 2012, it was with the commitment to purchase Chase's Mill, halt deterioration of the building, rehabilitate it, and then reopen it to the public. Although there is still important construction to be done – specifically, fundraising for and the construction of an ADA-compliant elevator, the installation of a septic system, and the design and construction of a parking area – we will open in July 2020 as planned.

This past year, the windows were restored, the siding was replaced, and the small turbine refurbished. Warren Brook was diverted, enabling completion of repairs to the mill pond and dam. Designs for the elevator and the septic system were completed and approved by the necessary entities.

In August, we hosted a day-long planning session to continue designing future uses and program offerings at the Mill. As a follow up, a leadership team was formed and is composed of educators, college interns, and talented craftspeople dedicated to developing community programming for all ages.



Throughout the year, we continued to photograph and catalogue hundreds of tools, some of which required detective work to discover their origins and uses. We created a preliminary Collections Policy for these and other artifacts. We also created a new Business Plan to carry us through 2023 and updated our Communications Plan.

Financial highlights of 2019 include receiving a total of \$202,662.70 in donations from 112 people. Of particular note was an extremely generous gift of \$150,000 from an anonymous individual. We also received a total of \$158,600 in grant funding, including 80 percent of the Land & Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) grant awarded in December 2018. We finished the work outlined in the LCHIP award and the balance will be paid in 2020. Additionally, we received in-kind donations totaling \$5,385.


As 2019 came to a close, we marveled briefly at all that had been accomplished since October 2016, when we purchased the property, and then we turned our sights to the numerous details to be completed between now and the opening in July. Guiding these tasks is our new, overall mission: to provide thoughtful, strategic stewardship of Chase's Mill while serving the community by delivering quality programming for children and adults.

Appropriately, last fall a large, dragon-shaped weathervane was placed atop the Mill. Its predecessor had been installed in 1921 shortly after completion of Hartley Dennett's renovation. The dragon remained on its perch for decades until one day, it simply disappeared. With a design from Ellen Chase, execution by Christy Sleezer of MetalMazing, and assistance from Rees Acheson, a new dragon was created. It now flies aloft, securely rooted to its restored perch, welcoming young and old, and pointing the way to future generations.



Looking to 2020

In July, Chase's Mill will thrum back to life. In the shop area on the main floor, children and adults will have the chance to learn crafts such as woodworking or how to tackle simple repairs of household items. Upstairs in the large gathering space, others will have the opportunity to tinker with words in crafting stories and other forms of writing. Visitors to the Mill may also participate in talks and discussions that include the history of mills and manufacturing in New England or the many uses and future possibilities of hydropower. Exhibits will inform us about our past while also looking to the future. Outside, a nature path along the brook will guide visitors to explore the remains of other mills that once stood nearby.



Though careful planning has gone into these initiatives, we intend a modest beginning to allow us time to learn, better understand, and refine how best to meet the needs of those who use the mill. This year, we will be open mid-July through mid-September, but beginning in 2021, we anticipate opening from May through October.

Goals for 2020 include raising \$50,000 to launch an endowment, expanding our volunteer board of directors, hiring a part-time administrator, and beginning construction on the elevator, septic, and parking. We also have other exciting projects in the works including a donation of a small parcel of land along Warren Brook to Prentis Hill Road. Heman Chase named this area "Lake Edith" in honor of his wife, and made small-scale dams for demonstration and educational purposes.


